With So Much More!

God, Jesus, and the Formation of the United States Pastor Jim

For many decades, a debate has raged regarding whether or not the United States was formed upon Judeo-Christian principles. My assertion is the United States was indeed formed upon a sincere faith and reliance upon God and Jesus and His teachings. My contribution to this month's edition of the MacPherson Press will concisely present

what I believe to be evidence supporting my assertion. I will do this through a judi-



cious use of the Declaration of Independence. Other documents where evidence of Judeo-Christian influence is witnessed are The Constitution, The Bill of Rights, and The Articles of Confederation, which were written in 1776-1777 and not ratified until 1781. This document was in essence a first attempt at developing a constitution for the United States.

In the Declaration of Independence there are four specific references to God. The first occurs in the opening paragraph and reads, "(...,) The separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, (...)". This opening paragraph is expressing the necessity to separate from a government system which ignores the opinions and ideas of the people and therefore the people are "Impel[led] to them to the separation."

The second reference occurs in the second paragraph and is perhaps the most often quoted portion of the Declaration. This second reference asserts, "(...,) That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; (...)". This statement affirms all "Human rights" are established by God and not by governments. I believe governments have done more to strip away human rights throughout the course of history than to protect them. Nevertheless, the rights we receive from God our Creator are inviolable while those that governments "provide" end up being transient at best.

It is in the final paragraph of the Declaration where one will find the final two specific references to God. The third reference is an appeal to God as the "Supreme Judge." The representatives to the Congress make an appeal to the "Supreme Judge" regarding the merits of their actions, hoping to become an independent and sovereign nation apart from the United Kingdom and King George III. Their collective belief was God alone would determine the correctness of declaring the colonies to be a free and independent nation.

The final reference to God in the Declaration of Independence is a part of one of the most profound statements ever made, and sadly this final statement is not well known by most American citizens. This final statement of the Declaration reads, "And, for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our

fortunes, and our sacred honor." Truly this is an amazing assertion. First, people today have become, by and large, exceedingly selfish and unwilling to help anyone unless they are able to derive personal benefit.

For the Colonists, they must have felt akin to Jesus' earliest followers seeking to live in a land where they were free to worship God and Jesus in safety without fear of persecution for their religious beliefs. The realization of the freedom to worship God/Jesus did not come easily.

Religion, primarily Protestantism, was an integral part of the coming revolution. In the decades preceding the beginning of the American Revolution, revivals spread throughout the colonies. God used engaging and passionate revivalists such as Jonathon Edwards and George Whitfield to reignite passion for Jesus primarily in the New England Colonies and upper Midwest. It is debated as to what extent the Great Awakening had on the formation of the United States. For me, the influence is undeniable. The religious fervor in the years leading up to the writing of the Declaration of Independence, The Constitution, and the Bill of Rights in my estimation played an extremely significant role in the creation of these documents of immense importance, not only to the United States, but to the entire world.

The very first clause of the First Amendment lends credence to my position. The first clause

emphatically states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; (...)." The beauty of this first clause of the First Amendment is that in order for it to be effective, it must apply equally to all faith traditions; this necessarily includes non-Judeo Christian faith traditions. Only in this way will it protect the religious freedoms of Catholics, Protestants, and Jews.

Each Sunday in July, the sermons will address an issue raised or set forth in the Declaration of Independence. In this way I hope everyone will come to understand just how important it was to those men and women of the Revolutionary period to include Jesus/God into the fabric of our nation.

What a beautiful morning in West Virginia!
The Cabell-Lincoln
Work Camp is slowly
coming alive. The mist
is rising, birds are singing, coffee is brewing,
and campers are waking, slowly emerging
from their cabins, gear-



ing up for another day at their work site.

Each year the work camp provides an opportunity to reach out and truly become the hands and feet of God. Each year campers put aside this week to reach out and spread God's love through the work of their hands, living the camp motto that "Love Works." The Cabell-Lincoln Work Camp provides a tangible way to put into practice that which we profess to believe. It is an opportunity to reach out and be the laborers who are sent out to the Lord's harvest; it is an opportunity to put your faith into action. That harvest is the theme of the camp this year, taken from Luke 10:1-2.

Now after this the Lord appointed seventy others, and sent them in pairs ahead of Him to every city and place where He Himself was going to come. And He was saying to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore beseech the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest.

This was a particularly appropriate theme for the year. There were 70 campers this year (up from about 40 last year) and all 70 were sent out as laborers. Whether we

were sent out to build a deck or install underpinning, the greater mission, of course, was to show God's love through our work.

And yet, Cabell-Lincoln Work Camp is not all about work. It is so much more than learning to measure a board, to use a drill, a circular saw, or a chop saw. It is also about the worship, the music, and the fellowship that we, the campers, share with fellow Christians. Our faith is renewed and strengthened as we fellowship with Christians who come from many different directions to share God's love. Campers often begin the week not knowing anyone on their work team and yet, by week's end, many lifelong friendships are formed. These strong bonds are renewed each year as the campers return to Cabell-Lincoln.

As an adult, I am always moved by the youth; they dispel the negative perceptions that we sometimes carry about the "young people today." What a blessing it is to watch our youth willingly give up a week of their summer to work in the hot sun (and it was really **HOT!**) building decks and installing underpinnings for complete strangers. How rewarding to see their faith in action. (You can see pictures from the week on the next page.)

Cabell-Lincoln Work Camp is a wonderful ministry and outreach. MacPherson has been supporting the work camp for many years, and I hope will continue to do so. Not everyone is in a position to be able to attend, but if you are, or if you would like to further explore what CLWC is all about, please reach out to me or to one of the other attendees. We love to share our experiences. Indeed CLWC lives out the words to one of the work camp's favorite songs:

Focusing Your Prayer Life

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. (Philippians 4:6, NIV)

Is it hard for you to stay focused when you pray? It is for me! I sit down with the intention of praying and soon after starting my mind wanders. I think about my to-do list. I think about the person or situation I'm praying over, which starts a chain of thought, which then leads me to reminisce. Before I know it, there I am wandering down memory lane! Sometimes an "instant replay" of harsh words or hurt feelings gets me off track. It doesn't take much, and the 15 minutes that I set aside for focused and intentional prayer is swallowed up. Well...there is hope! I have found an easy thing to do that has truly helped my prayer life.



You know those little, inexpensive photo albums with the plastic sleeves, one photo per page? If you slip a photo of the people on your prayer list into each sleeve, then when you sit down to pray you pick up your photo album. As you look at each photo, you pray

for that person. If your mind begins to wander, turn the page! If there is a specific mission, place, or situation that you've been asked to pray for (or feel led to pray for), find a photo to represent it. Praying for VBS? Take a clipping from the bulletin and give it a page! Tuck the "Keep In Prayer" page from the bulletin inside the back cover so you remember to pray for all those folks too.

It's a simple idea. Although I prefer having the actual, physical photo album in my hand, it would also be easy to create a digital one on your phone. Then it would always be with you, and could hold more than 24 photos! One thing to watch out for: Don't postpone praying for someone until you have a photo. This is meant to be an aid to prayer not an obstacle. Keep praying and praising!


Upcoming Events
